

RABBI'S REMARKS

Certain that I'm not the only one writing about the synagogue's renovation, I want, nevertheless, to comment on how exciting this summer's activity has been. From the very first day in mid-June, when the crews came to demolish the interior of the sanctuary, the social hall, the kitchen, the classrooms (12, 13, and 14), and the patio, we've seen daily progress. At each juncture, the excitement has grown and the enthusiasm for what we have begun has intensified. Those of us lucky enough to see the daily changes have been amazed at the new sense of space in the sanctuary building, and the possibilities for future use seem endless...perhaps even daunting. Without the pews, the raised Bimah, the curtain and the flooring, the room suddenly looked large and (even) majestic. Where previously the rooms (sanctuary and social hall) had looked small, there now seems to be a great expanse with endless possibilities. Of course, this was with the room totally empty. Once the new curtain is in place, once the floor is re-carpeted and re-tiled, once the new chairs are in place, the room will look smaller again, but those of us who saw the open space will remember the look and the fact that without permanent pews, there will always be the opportunity to open the room to its fullest.

Of course, the demolition happened rapidly. It's always easier to "tear down" than it is to "build up." We find ourselves in that latter stage, but even now the daily changes are noticeable and significant. Everything about the facility will be more functional and "multi-purpose." The patio has been "opened up" and there will be greater room; the gated entry from the parking lot has been expanded and widened; the lobby will be brightened with the inclusion of a skylight; the kitchen will be totally remodeled; the stage at the rear of the social hall has been removed and a new "multi-purpose" room has been created; the lighting throughout the facility has been upgraded and improved; the walls of the building have been cleaned and brightened. Most noticeable (and perhaps most jarring) of all, of course, will be the new look of the sanctuary. Removing the Bimah and the pews will make the sanctuary feel very different. It's my hope that the new configuration will also present a different psychological model of prayer and community.

Inevitably, a raised platform is a type of barrier and impediment to closeness. The "distance" between officiant and congregation is pronounced and (depending upon the height of the Bimah) exaggerated. Davening from the floor, as we do most of the time at Beth Ami, has been our way of minimizing that distance. Still, when reading from the Torah, we've been quite far removed from the congregation. Also, having fixed pews means that when sitting in the congregation, one sees only the back of the head of the person sitting in the forward pews. It's hard to see any faces, and consequently, it's harder to create a sense of community. By removing the raised Bimah, we hope to create a sense of closeness and accessibility not only to the

Ba'al Tefillah (the prayer leader) but also to the presence of God through the reading of the Torah. Just as we walk through the congregation while carrying the Torah scroll to and from the ark (signifying the accessibility of the Divine word) so too, do we wish to signify God's closeness to each individual during the reading from the scroll.

The removal of the pews is, we hope, also consistent with the desire to create closeness and community. With individual chairs we can configure the sanctuary in a myriad of ways.

Primarily, the chairs will be set in a 270-degree arc. In that way, no one will be terribly far from the reader's desk, and each person will be able to see the faces of others across the room. In addition, we will have the opportunity to anticipate the size of the congregation on any particular occasion and can set up an appropriate number of chairs, thereby creating a more intimate atmosphere whenever possible. Still, if the occasion warrants, we can reconfigure the sanctuary in a more "conventional," theater-style manner or in any way we desire. If we wish to "experiment" with various configurations, we will have that ability as well. All in all, the new arrangement will give us the flexibility to address a variety of situations and to tailor our responses to each unique occasion.

All of this activity should be just about finished by the time you read this. While certain elements will follow in the next few weeks (the completion of the kitchen, the arrival of the new chairs and the new reader's desk), the bulk of the work will be completed by the beginning of August and those of us who have been here daily hope that you will stop by to see what we have accomplished during these brief seven weeks. Certainly, we hope that you will be as excited about our new look as we are.

Hoping that the remainder of your summer is safe and productive, I look forward to seeing each of you in the fall.

RENOVATION NEWS

On June 18, work began on a major remodeling project at Beth Ami. When it is complete, by early fall, the sanctuary, social hall, kitchen, and rooms 12, 13, and 14 will be significantly renovated.

This is the third phase of the capital improvements that were initiated by the Capital Campaign, conducted in 2003-04. The first two phases included the repair of the sanctuary roof, renovations on the exterior of the sanctuary building, and the remodeling of the classrooms used by the nursery school. Originally, this current phase was to include the expansion of the site to accommodate housing the library, and a youth center. These plans proved to be prohibitively expensive, so we re-defined the scope of the third phase to include only renovations of the existing structures.





Only the beginning

If you have been around Beth Ami recently, you will know that this has been a most atypical summer. Usually a quiet time, this summer the synagogue is the scene of a tremendous amount of activity and disruption. This is due, of course, to the renovation of our main building, the kitchen, some classrooms, and the patio. By late August or early September, most of the work should be done. A project that has been in the works for three years will have become a reality.

While I believe that everyone will be very pleased with the result, I also know that finishing the physical renewal is only the beginning of a time of change. Our congregation is now challenged with an opportunity to look at everything we do, and to imagine how we should use our new space in the way that best achieves our vision of a vibrant spiritual community. We need to engage in an extended conversation about what that vision is, and how our use of space furthers the shaping of that vision.

For example, one of the most significant changes introduced by the renovation is in the sanctuary: there are no pews and there is no raised Bimah. This creates a space that is flexible and can be configured in many ways, not only for worship services, but also as part of the larger room that includes the social hall. And there is a new room at the south end, capable of being open to the social hall, or closed. There are many possible ways that this entire space could be used during holidays, or for Bnai Mitzvahs, or for Religious School on Sundays. Our imagination and willingness to rethink how we do things is the key to getting the most out of our new facility.

Our ability to work together is going to be vital, for although we are renovating and changing our buildings, we are not expanding them. That means that all of our activities are still competing for use in the same amount of space. Our new space is more flexible and updated, but it is now like an artist's blank canvas. It is up to us to provide the imagination, and cooperation, to create the finished work – a synagogue full of activities, fulfilling our vision of Judaism and our community.

ISRAEL FROM THE LEFT COAST

This column is written by friends of Bob Raful, also members of Beth Ami, who recently returned from a special trip to Israel. Here is their report:

We had the good fortune to be in Israel for the celebration of the 40th year of the reunification of Jerusalem. For Betty, this brought back memories of her first visit to Israel in 1960 when Jordan controlled the old city and they prohibited Jews from visiting or praying at our holy sites or entering any of the other areas they controlled. Now, under Israeli sovereignty, people of all religions have access to their holy sites.

Despite thunder storms that caused some events to be cancelled, thousands of Israelis came out to celebrate the occasion. The streets and sidewalks were filled with people, young and old, playing music, singing, and dancing with Israeli flags. This was a time to appreciate the diversity of Israelis as people of all ages, colors, and modes of dress, from tank tops and shorts to Chasidic suits and hats, celebrated together.

One of the purposes of our trip was to participate in a seminar on how to become more effective advocates for Israel. The three-day seminar was organized through the Coalition of Hasbara Volunteers (CoHaV), an international umbrella organization for the many volunteer Israel advocacy groups around the world.

On the first day we had a bus trip to the Golan, led by an enthusiastic, well-informed guide. Even those of us who felt we had a good understanding of the situation learned new things. The workshop on the second day provided presentations on effective letter writing led by a staff member of CAMERA, on how to use the Internet to give accurate and unbiased information about Israel, and on how to give presentations. On the final day we met at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to learn from various government ministers as well as a representative from the Jerusalem Post. Contact us if you would like to hear more about the seminar. It was so successful that another will be planned, probably in November 2008.

We have any number of very talented, knowledgeable people who can help you learn to chant Torah and haftarah, lead services (one piece at a time), read Hebrew, prepare a d'var Torah, lay tefillin, or bake a challah! We're looking for more Beth Ami folks to act as gabbaim, lift and bind Torahs, and lead part of services on Shabbat. We even have a program planned to help you learn if you'd like to give it a chance—no matter your age or gender!

C'mon ... take a leap of faith. It's a great exercise!

Highlights of the project include:

- Complete remodeling of the kitchen, with all new appliances, cabinetry, layout, and flooring;
- A new room, at the south end of the social hall where the stage formerly stood;
- A single-level sanctuary, using chairs instead of pews, with all new lighting, wall finishes, windows, and carpeting;
- The lobby will include new doors, a skylight, new lighting, new floor and wall finishes;

OR AMI RELIGIOUS SCHOOL REPORT

“Education is that which remains when one has forgotten everything he learned at school.”
Albert Einstein

Strange quote from a Jewish educator, nu? Too much sun this summer? Not really, but I have been reading an excellent biography of Albert Einstein by Walter Isaacson and I remembered this quote. It’s one of the truest statements I’ve ever encountered.

What do *you* remember? Please, just take a minute to reflect. What do you really remember about pre-school, Kindergarten and grades one through four? Do you remember the contents from those carefully planned lessons? Really? Try to think back.

I know what I recall. My Kindergarten teacher had red hair, a quiet voice, played the piano occasionally and took us for walks. I dimly remember one such walk as being beautiful and I remember one art project. From First grade I retain the memory of a cold winter day when an unexpected hot chocolate was served to all the children, as we stood on the playground. I remember that my teacher was kind and that I loved to get the sky blue pieces of paper she handed out for every A. If you got 10 of those pretty blue papers, you could trade them in for a prize.

I loved those brilliant blue scraps. I did not consider the prizes a good enough trade and instead hoarded my bits of sky in a box and refused to give them up. Second grade—nothing. Third grade was when I discovered that you could get books for free from the school library and that

Global warning (houses in Siberia collapsing because the permafrost is melting), wildfires across the Southwest, rising energy prices (how high WILL gas go this summer?), drought in California (the State Water Resources Board says Sonoma County must reduce water use by 15% from 7/1-10/28, but we only reduced our use by 9.9% the first 15 days of July), the mid-East situation—all the news seems overwhelming. What can we do about it, we ask? While hi-tech solutions and new legislation will help, we don’t have to wait for them. There are many simple things each of us can do to reduce water and energy use—decreasing global warming. Of course this’ll save us money, but it’s also a mitzvah—in the long run, the mitzvah of p’kuach n’fesh —saving a life. Here are a few simple suggestions for reducing water use, home energy consumption and gasoline use:

was the real beginning of an education that has never paused, never stopped.

I am certainly not saying that I didn’t learn in school or that my teachers didn’t do their job. Far from it. I went into that First grade classroom as a non-reader and emerged as an insatiable reader. I just don’t remember how it happened. I learned to count, add, subtract, and multiply, but those actual learning experiences are not remembered. I do remember a terrific thunderstorm in Fourth grade. Rain poured down so hard that our classroom windows looked black. Lightning lit up the room and thunder shook the building. Yet I felt completely safe and happy in my classroom, inhaling the smell of crayons and paste, as we made Halloween decorations of pumpkins with accordion-pleated legs. I also remember that we studied the “13 original colonies and Vermont.” Two other little girls and I got to be “and Vermont.” That’s it. “And Vermont” is branded in memory.

What happened to the rest of the curriculum? I don’t know. I’ve forgotten.

The memories I *have* kept all have something in common. Do you see what remained? I had more *good* school experiences than *bad* ones and that meant that I liked school, liked going there, liked being there and that was a very good base for the education that followed.

I’ve thought about this a lot this summer and decided that what I’d like to offer our children is a school environment that, while it teaches Hebrew, prayer, history and more, will also be an environment that will create *good* experiences and memories for our students. If we can do that, then we will have created a solid base for Jewish life and Jewish learning. And that’s what we intend to do this year; that’s our goal. The teachers and I have met, planned and plotted and we have some exciting things scheduled to create a really memorable year. We can’t wait to see you all in September and get started.

(P.S. I’ll bet you thought I’d write about the renovation.)

- ❖ Increase your mileage by 1-2 mpg just by keeping your tires properly inflated.


