A Different Pesach!

I must admit I wasn't looking forward to it. No! I'm not referring to Pesach, as the title might imply; it was the thought of returning to St. Louis so that we could empty out the contents of our home and ready it for its new owners. Over twenty years of accumulation required purging. Decisions needed to be made:

- 1. What would we ship back to Santa Rosa?
- 2. What would we try to sell?
- 3. What would we have to have carted away?

Closing was scheduled for March 28th and in looking over our schedule, the only oppor-tunity for Susan and me to fly to St. Louis would be the weekend before, returning late Sunday evening. We decided to take a late Wednesday night flight out of San Francisco which would give us Thursday, Friday, Saturday night and Sunday to try to get the job done. Of course the fact that Monday was erev Pesach only added to the level of stress!

We had advertised an "Estate Sale" in the Post-Dispatch and offered two larger items on Craig's List. Whatever didn't sell would have to be carted off or shipped to Santa Rosa, and there wasn't exactly a "big window" in which to figure which was which.

On Friday, people stopped by in a trickle. At the same time I had to figure what we were going to have hauled off, since we only had Friday and Sunday to do the job. While past experience at these sales had been less than encouraging, I must admit that I did learn two major lessons this time.

A gentleman stopped by to see what we had for sale. In the basement he came across a rusty enamel cabinet that had come with the house when we bought it in 1991. It was so decrepit that I never used it for anything in over twenty years. The gentleman saw me and said, "How much do you want for this cabinet?"

I responded, "What would you say to \$20?"

Without another word he took twenty dollars out of his pocket and handed it to me. Now it's possible that I sold him a 2,000 dollar cabinet for \$20 dollars, but that's fine with me. From my "non-expert" perspective the lesson learned was: Never try to guess what anyone might want to purchase! Lesson number two for garage/estate sales was: make sure you have a table or two with nothing marked and let people know they can name their price. (I really think it's a "control thing"!)

Finally, it really was a tremendous lesson having to send so much "stuff" off with the hauler. He wound up taking four (Yes, four!) cartloads. A lot of the things he took weren't junk at all; just things we couldn't take with us nor sell. (A big snowstorm, Sunday, had a negative effect on anyone who might have been curious to see what we had to offer). It made me realize just how ephemeral a hold we have on the material things we think we "own". It really doesn't take much at all to lose our grip on them. Coming, as this experience did, on the eve of Pesach, it made me wonder what it must have been like for those Israelites, leaving their homes in Egypt and having to make similar decisions, all for something they believed would be better.

May you and your families be blessed with a relaxing and safe summer.

President's Message Arnold Drake, President



Almost 12 years ago our

synagogue embarked on an ambitious Capital Campaign. The building needed major repairs and renovations, and a Capital Campaign yielded promises of \$1.3 million dollars. That money was to pay the principal and interest on a loan of \$750,000.

If \$1.1 million dollars of those pledges had been paid on time, the loan would have been retired in ten years. Several things happened. Many pledges were not honored on time for various reasons. Some pledges were never honored. Some members moved away. We had to endure the Great Recession. But loyal congregants redeemed over \$700,000 of those pledges over the years. We lowered our loan balance from \$750.000 to \$530,000. And we never missed an interest payment.

This year we resumed the Capital Campaign. We asked all new members, and all members who had never made a pledge, to consider a donation to the Capital Campaign. In addition, several congregants who hade made a contribution to the Capital Campaign in the past made a new commitment. The Board of Directors directed that interest payments on the loan be made from operating funds, and that all Capital Campaign contributions be used to reduce the principal of the loan. Then the Friedman family gave us a wonderful gift. And Bill Friedman personally negotiated a lower interest rate for us at the bank.

As a result, our loan balance is now well below \$300,000. Our monthly interest payment is about one-third of what it was. And we have new pledges of over \$150,000 from congregants, and promises to pay old pledges of \$70,000.

Our goal is to retire this loan over the next five years. And we need to establish a fund for major capital improvements and repairs. As I stated in my letter to you, a building does not exist for free. We will continue to have expenses with the repair and maintenance of our synagogue. But we have suspended our Capital Campaign for this year. Next year we will again ask any members who did not make a significant Capital Campaign pledge to please consider supporting our synagogue with a financial gift to be paid over five years.

Besides, we wish to have a party when we "burn" our note to the bank!!!.....I know you will help.

Shavu'ot


Shavu'ot is one of the 'Shalosh Regalim', the three Biblical pilgrimage festivals when all Jews gathered together at the Temple. The word Shavuot means "weeks." It marks the completion of the seven week counting period 'the Omer' between Passover and Shavuot when the first wheat is harvested, It is also known as Hag HaKatzir the 'Harvest Festival' or the 'Holiday of First Fruits' as the first produce of the land is brought into the Temple. The holiday of Shavuot is a two day holiday, beginning at sundown of the 5th of Sivan and lasting until nightfall of the 7th of Sivan. (In Israel it is a one day holiday, ending at nightfall of the 6th of Sivan.)

Shavuot is also the Jewish holiday that celebrates the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. It took Moses and the Israelites seven weeks of trekking through the desert to reach Mount Sinai. The Omer are the forty-nine days between the holiday of Passover (leaving Egypt), and the holiday of Shavuot (weeks) receiving the Torah on the 50th day. The Talmud tells us that God gave the Ten Commandments to the Jews on the sixth night of the Hebrew month of Sivan.

Kosalind Franklin was born in London on July 25, 1920. Franklin studied chemistry and physics at Cambridge, and, in 1942, began carrying out research that helped develop carbon fibre technology.

As a woman and a Jew, Franklin faced many difficulties. The combination of anti-Semitism and sexism also was an underlying factor in her work. Franklin made a number of advances in

x-ray diffraction techniques with DNA that contributed to the 1962 Nobel Prize. Many scientists believe Franklin played a larger than acknowledged role in the research that led to the discovery of DNA's double helix.

Later, Franklin joined Birkbeck College to carry out research into the tobacco mosaic virus. Her findings laid the foundation for structural virology.






When I think of the Shoah, I envision crowds of terrified Jews, young and old, religious and secular; all facing the same unimaginable horrors: frightening raids; dreadful dehumanization; forced marches; gruesome gas chambers. In simple terms, they faced inhumane efforts to annihilate a people, my people, our people.

I have heard references to the horrors and lessons of the Holocaust as long as I can remember. I read Number the Stars, a novel that made me deeply appreciate the sacrifices that Jewish people have made. Schindler's List was difficult to watch, but it made me think of how important it is to reach out to help those suffering crimes against humanity. I had the same revelation when I visited the Holocaust Museum in Washington and saw the connection between history and current genocides. When Lillian Judd spoke at my Walk to End Genocide, hundreds of people were riveted as she told of her father being brutally murdered in front of her and quietly spoke of her mother and sisters dying in the gas chambers. People listened when she implored us to speak against intolerance and encouraged us to create a hate-free, genocide- free future. I pledged that for the rest of my life I would honor my Jewish heritage and help repair the world. Even though the world said, "Never Again" after 6 million Jews were murdered in the Holocaust, almost 6 million more have lost their lives in Sudan and Congo and 46 more genocides have taken place around the world. Every day, young girls are brutalized and boys even younger than I are being forced to become child soldiers. Too many people turn their backs, just as they did during the Holocaust. Whether Jew or gentile, suffering is suffering and we must say "Never Again" and mean it. As Elie Wiesel said, "We have absolutely no right to disregard another when the other is suffering. If you stand by, you are an accomplice."

I did not stand idly by. My voice was heard on Capitol Hill where I spoke passionately about international human rights. After one of my Walks to End Genocide, the Board of Supervisors declared April Genocide Awareness month. My Walks and community-based movement the last six years have raised awareness and over \$100,000 to provide support and hope for survivors of genocide. After hearing testimonies of Holocaust survivors and working to combat genocide and human rights abuses, I knew I had to go to Africa to meet some of the people I'd been working to help.

In Rwanda, it became real and personal. I met Jimmy, an 18-year-old orphan, who was found on his mother's murdered body when he was just two during the genocide, where 1 million people were slaughtered. Today, he smiles and has a passion for learning. Then I met Lawrence, who told of seeing 13 of her 14 children and her husband murdered in front of her during the genocide...by their NEIGHBOR. She wiped away OUR tears, and I struggled to believe it when she told us that she had forgiven her neighbor. Lillian Judd, Susy Raful, Lawrence, and Jimmy live a world apart in geography, but they share experiences that genocide survivors, regardless of religion or ethnicity, carry with them. They share their suffering, strength and resolve to rebuild their lives and pay tribute to those who perished.

I brought my experiences back to Sonoma County. Perhaps through my stories and involvement in my Walks, a bull<mark>y</mark> who once made ethnic iokes will choose instead to speak out against intolerance. Perhaps others will be inspired to listen to survivors' testimonies and understand that the Holocaust did not begin in gas chambe<mark>rs</mark> but rather with words. Perhaps we will all work together to build peace and acceptance in our communities and throughout the world.



By recalling the past and integrating lessons learned from the holocaust into our daily lives, we honor survivors and those who perished. We must keep the message alive that hatred destroys people and put our thoughts into action as we work to prevent a recurrence. We must ensure that our history will stay with us forever. We can forgive but we must NEVER forget!

Gabe Ferrick lives in Santa Rosa and is Senior Class President at Montgomery High School. He is a member of Chaverim youth group and was a Shomrei Torah religious school teaching assistant for three years. Gabe is a Diller Tikkun Olam Award winner, has raised over \$108,000 to aid those impacted by human rights abuses, and his 5th Annual Santa Rosa Walk to End Genocide will start and end at Congregation Shomrei Torah on Sunday, April 14.

Gabe will attend college in the fall and aspires to become an engineer so that he will be able to solve problems and help develop creative solutions here and abroad for those in need.

ISRAEL FROM THE LEFT COAST Bob Raful

MEMO FROM JERUSALEM Nothing is better than an up close

and personal, behind the scenes story of life in Israel - This is one: Vivian Klein's sister, Meggi and brother-in-law, Tuly are very successful caterers in Israel. They do a big business with weddings, Bar Mitzvahs, plus a number of major State Dinners for the President. SO—let us look at Meggi's emailed story to their Uncle Stan Feingold:



....Dear Uncle Stan, here is a nutshell synopses of the past three weeks. When it became evident that Obama was sure to come, Shimon Peres's people started to look for the right caterer. We had worked there a few times before and Tuly had a great relationship with some of his most difficult staff. We wrote up one menu, they asked to taste another complete one and scheduled a tasting date. My staff and myself worked really hard that day.

As it turned out, the Peres staff went to two other caterers and other restaurant chefs too. Between Tuly's expert human relationship skills and the kitchen's meticulous work, we were commissioned for the job. Unfortunately (or fortunately, depending how you think about it...) we were already booked for two other weddings that day. But there was no way we were going to pass on this once in a lifetime opportunity! It was all about the logistics and staff and planning, so we started immediately. Over the next two weeks the menu changed almost on a daily basis, as Peres's staff had a really hard time making up their minds. We didn't agree with many of their choices, but let them have their way.

As the big day came closer, I kept thinking how proud both my Dad and Mom would have been!

Most of our equipment for a Thursday dinner was transferred to Jerusalem on Sunday, so every plate, glass and cooking utensil would be electronically screened before the big day. 2 days before Tuly and I each went on national TV, for two different morning shows.

On the day of the Real Thing, representatives of the Health Ministry were with us all day. A member of The White House Chef staff spent the afternoon and evening with me. Tasting, watching and choosing the plate that would be served to The President.

It was huge. I felt really honored.

I am told, and I hear that everyone on the floor was really happy with the food. I was (happily) buried in the kitchen with my staff, doing my thing. There is always something in perspective that we know we could have done differently, maybe better, and we try to learn. But considering what we had going on, the day was a profound one: Professionally and personally.

Summertime and the living is easy—it's a great time to go to the beach AND to think about the ocean and how to save it

June 8th is World Oceans Day. Global warming has heavily impacted the world's oceans, which are also being over fished, and polluted with plastics. These three problems top theNational Geographic's list of ways to save the ocean at http://ocean.nationalgeographic.com/ocean/take-action/10-things-you-can-do-to-save-the-ocean/.

• Reducing energy use and lowering your carbon footprint will help to slow global warming (it may be too late to actually reduce it). You can monitor your carbon footprint at http://www.nature.org/greenliving/carboncalculator/index.htm,

and also donate to offset your use. During vacations, especially be mindful of the impact of your travelplans. Flying contributes the most towards global warming.

- Choosing sustainable seafood will help the many fish populations that have been severely depleted, due to demand, habitat destruction, and unsustainable fishing practices. Pick up a pocket guide to sustainable (and safe) choices at most fish markets or download a free guide from http://www.montereybayaquarium.org/cr/cr_seafoodwatch/download.aspx.
- Reduce the amount of plastic you use and responsibly recycle the rest. Plastics endup in the ocean, where they entangle and kill thousands of marine animals annually. In recent years there has been a lot of publicity about the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch," a conglomeration of mostly small bits of plastic floating on or below the surface of the ocean. The approximately 46,000 pieces of plastic per square mile of ocean kill 100,000 marine mammals and one million birds each year. Once thought to be an island the size of Texas, the "Garbage Patch" is now believed to actually be a thin soup covering 2/3 of the planet's surface. As such, all efforts to removeit are doomed, but eventually these bits and pieces either sink to the bottom or come ashore. If we quit adding to the problem, eventually the ocean can clean itself. Carry a water bottle, use your own reusable shopping bags, and find reusable items to replace throwaway plastic bags, containers, and cutlery (40 billion use-and-toss utensils are consumed in the U.S. every year.) Find great options at http://www.reuseit.com/,

which has empowered nearly 325,000 customers to eliminate over 1.2 billion use-and-tossitems. They also donate 1% of their profits to 1% For the Planet.

June 8th is Shabbat, but why not plan to go to the ocean on Sunday and clean-up the beach a bit?



The story of Ruth is associated with Shavu'ot. It is the story of the first conversion to Judaism. A famine forces Elimelech and his wife Naomi to flee from their Israelite home to the foreign country of Moab. Soon Elimelech dies, and Naomi is widowed in Moab. She continues living there with her two sons, who eventually marry two Moabite girls, Orpah and Ruth. Tragically, both sons also die, leaving Naomi to live with her two widowed daughtersin-law in a strange land. Naomi decides to leave Moab and journey to Bethlehem to live amongst the Israelites again. She encourages both Orpah and Ruth to return to their parents and remarry in Moab. Orpah reluctantly agrees, but Ruth refuses – out of love, she chooses instead to stay with her mother-in-law and embrace Judaism. This could not have been an easy choice, for Ruth had to leave behind everything she knew in order to stay with Naomi. Her kindness and obedience to God are eventually rewarded in Bethlehem, where she marries a wealthy farm owner named Boaz. Together they have a son named Obed, who becomes the grandfather of King David. Ruth's choice to stay with Naomi and embrace Judaism also made her a part of this important lineage.

Ruth made famous the phrase, "For wherever you go, I will go; wherever you live, I will live. Your people will be my people, and your God will be my God." The story of Ruth teaches us that unconditional love often requires sacrifice. Ruth makes a difficult choice, and her kindness is rewarded in the end. The message is that God blesses those who are good and merciful.

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Shavuot and Food

The Festival of Shavuot, the Feast of the Weeks, Chag Habikkurim, the Festival of the First-fruits; all describe the festival that started with ancient agricultural origins associated with the sweetness of spring bounty that later in history shifted to the Revelation of Torah.

The First-fruits of Spring being dates, figs, grapes, pomegranates and olives; the last harvest of barley, and the first harvest of wheat compose the seven species available in this ancient land of Israel. These comprised the First-fruit offerings made to the ancient temple during this festival. The two loaves of bread made from the finest flour were given by Jews from their farms given to the priests at the temple for wave offerings.

In the Bible (Exodus 23:19; 34:26), a reference is made twice to bringing the first fruits "You shall bring the first-fruits of your land to the house of the Lord your God...", and it is paired along with the reference to what rabbis inferred as a command to separate milk from meat "You shall not cook a kid in its mother's milk". Eating dairy food on the Festival of the First Fruits was drawn from this association of ideas.

Dairy foods also serve during Shavuot as symbolic of milk. Milk is symbolic of the infancy of the Jewish people, and their birth as a nation at Mount Sinai. Milk is the breast food that according to the story, Moses would only drink from his Israeli mother and not drink from his new non-Jewish mother. Chalev, (milk in Hebrew) numerically is 40, which corresponds to the number of days Moses spent on the Mount studying Torah so that he could teach it to the Israelites. Milk in Hebew, Chalev, is also an acronym formed of Hebrew letters meaning "To declare Your lovingkindness in the morning" (Psalms 92:3) and the entire Torah is lovingkindness. Song of Songs verse 4.11: "knowledge of the torah is like milk and honey under the tonque."
