


RABBI'S REMARKS

A Hanukah Miracle

It all started so innocently!

I had some “thank-yous” to write and I’d run out of postage stamps. I headed to the Clayton, MO Post Office to buy a few more. I found a parking space, (never to be taken for granted), and headed in. I glanced into the hall where the clerks attend to the customers and saw that there was a wait. So I walked back to one of the automatic vending machines at the entrance.

I looked over the options. It appeared that my one choice was the item mysteriously labeled “Holiday Baubles”. I pressed the appropriate button, put in my credit card and awaited results. Out came two sheets of stamps. Perhaps I shouldn’t have been surprised; each stamp was adorned with a picture of one of those glass ornaments people put on Christmas Trees. I realized I had made a mistake, so I reluctantly headed back to the main hall to speak to a clerk.

After waiting for my number to come up, I went up to the clerk. I knew him from many previous visits and explained my predicament to him.

“Sorry,” Bill said, “but we’re not allowed to exchange stamps.” (He couldn’t look me in the eye).

I stood back in disbelief. “You’ve got to be kidding! I just bought these over at the machine.”

“Yes,” he said, “and that’s the other problem: different stock inventory. What’s more, it says ‘All sales final’ on the bottom of your receipt.”

I laughed ironically at the bureaucracy. “This is amazing! Of course I didn’t actually get the receipt until I bought the stamps. The other part is that I’m a rabbi and I have to send some notes to Jewish people. I can only imagine the impression it’s going to make on them when they see the Christmas stamps.”

“I’m really sorry,” he said. “There’s really nothing I can do about it.”

I had pretty much figured that I was going to have to use the stamps, but I couldn’t help noticing that the clerk was blushing. “Bill, you’re

blushing! You have to be embarrassed yourself to have to tell me this.”

Bill nodded and I thought that was going to be the end of it, but another clerk was sitting at the adjoining counter. She had been listening to the conversation as she wasn’t helping customers at the time.

“I’ll tell you what I’m going to do,” she said. “I’m going to buy one of the sheets of stamps. It’s only that I don’t have enough cash on me to buy both. At least you’ll be able to replace the one sheet.”

I was really touched and impressed by her consideration. “Thank you,” I said, “You’re really going over the top on this one!”

“No problem!” She fished in her purse for the money and handed it to Bob. Bob went over to another drawer and brought out a sheet of ...Hanukah stamps! I handed my “baubles” over to Dianne. I was about to leave when a thought occurred to me.

“Dianne, I have a ‘twenty’ I can give you. You can just pay me back tomorrow. That way you can buy the second sheet.”

At this point, Bill turned to Dianne, “Listen, I’ll spot you the change and you can take care of it when you see me tomorrow.”

“Thanks,” I said. “I can’t believe how considerate you both have been. That’s really impressive!”

“Glad to oblige.”

I hadn’t realized it at the time, but during this whole transaction a crowd had begun to assemble. I turned around to see a few hostile faces. It’s bad enough when the customer ahead spends time chatting with a clerk while you’re waiting to do business. I had succeeded in making a “double-play!”

All I could think of was to say to the lady next in line with a slight shrug of my shoulder, “High finance!”

I was relieved to see a smile cross her face as I hurried out to the car.

May your Hanukah be filled with miracles!

(with a little help from a few women)

In a little over an hour, the Sukkah Builder's Team erected the Beth Ami Sukkah in the courtyard in front of the shul. After Sunday minyan and breakfast, supplied by the Stein-Larsons, Ishie Petlock found the Sukkah (stored on top of tables in the Social Hall closet!). He and Gary Highland got most of the parts out to the courtyard. Helping to shlep and put up the framework, fabric and other Sukkah components were Arnold Drake, Michael Shapiro, Jeffrey and Janet Stein-Larson, and Mark Rosen. Tish Levee and Carose Mendoza helped tie the little bungee cords holding the fabric to the framework. Michael, Arnold, Jeffrey and Janet put on the shchach.

Israeli Speaker—Oct. 30

The Director of the Gush Etzion Foundation, Shani Abrams Simkovitz, will speak at Congregation Beth Ami about this historic locale, how the Gush Etzion played an heroic and important part in Israel's war of Independence in 1947, as Jerusalem and surrounding Jewish areas were blockaded and attacked in response to the U.N. resolution to partition Palestine.

The Bnei Etzion, the children of those who fought and died, returned 19 year later to reestablish their community and created a memorial in the very spot where their parents hid during the final attack.

In honor of the 100th anniversary of the Kibbutz Movement, this site was declared a National Heritage Project by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu. The Jewish National Fund (JNF) has launched a special campaign with the Gush Etzion Foundation and others to revitalize the museum at the memorial.

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Hanukkah

Will the stores be selling turkey-shaped dreidels? Maybe Horn of Plenty oil holders to keep the lights going?

Hanukkah will be on Thanksgiving this year.

Thanksgiving is set as the fourth Thursday in November, meaning the latest it can be is 11/28. 11/28 is also the earliest Hanukkah can be.

The Jewish calendar repeats on a 19 year cycle, and Thanksgiving repeats on a 7 year cycle. You would therefore expect them to coincide roughly every $19 \times 7 = 133$ years. Looking back, this is approximately correct—the last time it would have happened was 1861. However, Thanksgiving was only formally established by President Lincoln in 1863. So, it has never happened before.

Why won’t it ever happen again? The reason is because the Jewish calendar is very slowly getting out of sync with the solar calendar, at a rate of 4 days per 1000 years. This means that while presently Hanukkah can be as early as 11/28, over the years the calendar will drift forward, such that the earliest Hanukkah can be is 11/29. The next time Hanukkah falls on 11/28 is 2146, which is a Monday. Therefore, 2013 is the only time Hanukkah will ever overlap with Thanksgiving. Of course, if the Jewish calendar is never modified in any way, then it will slowly move forward through the Gregorian calendar, until it loops all the way back to where it is now. So, Hanukkah would again fall on Thursday, 11/28...in the year 79,811. Given our trajectory with global warming, it is fair to say humans won’t be here then and if there are no humans, the holidays will be cancelled.

So on November 28th 2013, enjoy your turkey and your latkes. It has never happened before, and it will never happen again.

Winter Holidays Are Coming

For the first *and* only time ever, Thanksgiving and the 1st day of Hanukkah occur on Nov. 28th (find out why it's the only time it will happen, at <https://sites.google.com/site/mizrahijonathan/home/ThanksgivingAndHanukkah>.) Holidays mean gifts, decorations, and lots and lots of food, which can also mean huge amounts of waste. This means we can practice two important mitzvot:

Ma'achil R'evim—Feeding The Hungry

Nearly one billion people (1 in 7) worldwide (and 17.2 million households in the U.S.) are going hungry. Help by donating to Mazon (<http://mazon.org/>), the Malk Fund at Beth Ami, and putting extra food in the food barrel in the shul lobby or in Redwood Empire Food Bank's barrels in stores. Another important way to help feed the hungry involves the mitzvah of...

Bal Tashchit—Not Wasting Resources

Americans generate an extra five million tons of household waste each year between Thanksgiving and Jan. 1st, including wasting three times as much food as the rest of the year. According to the U. N. Food and Agriculture Organization, roughly one-third of all food produced for human consumption—approximately 1.3 billion tons—is lost or wasted each year—34 million tons a year in the U.S. Consumers in developed countries, such as the U.S., are responsible for 222 million tons of this waste—nearly the amount of food that is produced in all of sub-Saharan Africa. Wasted food that is not composted (most of it) ends up in landfills where it produces methane emissions, a greenhouse gas with a warming effect 21 times greater than carbon dioxide. Check out <http://www.worldwatch.org/reducing-food-waste-during-the-holiday-season> for the Worldwatch Institute's 10 simple steps to waste less food.

ISRAEL FROM THE LEFT COAST

The following blog, published in the *Jerusalem Post* on August 30th was written by Rabbi Andrew Sacks the Director of the Masorti (Conservative) Movement's Rabbinical Assembly in Israel (the organization of Masorti/Conservative rabbis). Normally I stay away from items about internal disputes; but this one directly affects my rights to pray in Jerusalem. Find the entire piece on the *Jerusalem Post* web site.

"This morning I was contacted by an American journalist writing about the marginalization of the non-Orthodox movements in Israel. She wanted my views on this subject. I am not sure that my response was in line with her premise. I have begun to feel optimistic.

Since the Masorti Movement was established in Israel we have found the doors to MKs and ministers closed. Our congregations, youth groups, and rabbis were not granted funding. The political coalitions with the zealously Orthodox made speaking with us in any official capacity almost radioactive.

But that was then. This is now. There seems to be a new spirit in the air. Maybe I am naïve. Maybe I am excited by what may turn out to be a passing phenomena. But I am seeing something I have not witnessed since my Aliyah in 1987.

The Minister of Religions has met with Masorti and Reform leaders. In fact he greeted us in the Knesset. So too the Chair of the Knesset. In June our rabbis met with the President of Israel at his home. The Minister of Justice has met with us on numerous occasions.

Now had all of this been confined to a few meetings where niceties were exchanged—some of us may have said Dayeinu (we are pleased). But it did not end there.

The courts have decided that non-Orthodox rabbis may be entitled to funding. Our right to use of Mikvehs will soon be adjudicated. The doors to dialogue are open.

Just this week the new egalitarian section of

the Kotel was opened to the public. Davening 24/7 is now available at the Robinson's Arch area. The government will provide Sifrei Torah (they are currently provided by the Masorti Movement). Masorti prayer books will be purchased by the government. This is the southern end of the Western wall. It embodies no less sanctity that the section to its side. Indeed the atmosphere is more peaceful and the area cleaner. (Ed. Note—During our last visit, Susy and I prayed at the area described here. It is a special spiritual place)

Last year hundreds of Minyanim, and over twenty thousand people, davened at the new Kotel space through the Masorti Movement. That number will now grow as more hours and resources are made available. And we shall not be limited to weekday mornings only. You may now daven there on Erev Shabbat and Shabbat morning. In deed you may daven there any time you wish. This is a victory for all of the Jewish people who believe in religious pluralism. It is available for women's prayer groups—those that feel that to daven as a woman's prayer group in this section is just fine. I believe that this compromise comes as a result of new found attention paid to the non-Orthodox denominations both in Israel and in the Diaspora.

There is truth in those who protest that separate but equal is not truly equal. But again I would assert that perfect is often the enemy of good. Indeed, the pluralistic area is more esthetic and pastoral.

Our struggle for religious pluralism shall continue. We will continue to work to advance our goals."

There is not one, but three great pieces of news from the library. First of all, we replaced the big table and the 10 chairs with four *really comfortable easy chairs* and two smaller tables for a more informal look. Second, *the library is now open both during business hours of the office* (Mon.–Thurs., 10 a.m.–4:30 p.m. and Fri., 10 a.m.–2 p.m.) and on every Sunday morning when there is religious school. We did these changes so we could invite you to spend in the library. Come on in between two errands when you are running around town, or when you want to have a quiet hour and immerse yourself into the space of great Jewish books.

The third and possibly the best, news is that we instituted a self-checkout *system*. This means that you are allowed, welcome and encouraged to borrow books (and DVDs, CDs, and tapes) from the library, even when there is no librarian present. We only ask you to

Fill out the sheet on the desk, including your full name and phone number, the spine number (including the second and third line if they exist) and the material number (the six digit number written in pencil or printed under the bar-code on the inside of the book)

Borrow no more than 10 items at a time

Leave the items/books you bring back on the librarian's desk or in the library's box in the office.

If you are new to the library, i.e. you never borrowed an item before, fill out the patron registration form that includes your name, address, phone number and affiliation.

We hope that these changes will improve your library experience, that you will re-discover more of the treasures we have hiding here, and that they will keep enriching your life.


