Ever wonder how Beth Ami got here? Who started our congregation and kept it going for the past 70 years?


On Sunday, Feb. 23rd at Beth Ami, we will Celebrate our History and Honor our Pioneers.

# The Nature of Dignity...or What it Means to Become an Adult

"So the question shifts to

"Who or what do you serve?

To whom or what do you

devote your life?""

For those of us well past the age of thirteen; we can appreciate the irony when the Bar or Bat Mitzvah says, "Today I am a man," or "Today I'm a woman."

On the surface, we know that they still have many years to go before they can really speak about being an adult, but how many of us pause to consider what it really means to become an adult? How does that relate to the ceremony of Bar or Bat Mitzvah, and beyond the opportunity it offers for celebration—(not

to be sneezed at by any means!)—of what profound significance does it really have?

What does it mean to become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah?

In Hebrew the term

is an idiom which denotes that such an individual has reached a point in their development where they understand the consequences of their behavior in society. Traditionally, there is a b'rachah to be recited by the parents of a child who reaches this stage. "Baruch... she'patrani me'onsho shel zeh." "Blessed art You...Who has absolved me of the consequences due to this person."

In other words; up to this point in the child's development, the parent is held responsible for their child's actions (read *misbehavior*); from this point on, the child is now held accountable. To put this in Jewish terms since Mitz'vot (i.e. Divine Commandments) define the responsibilities of the individual—what their Creator obligates them to do and what their Creator forbids them to do; becoming Bar or Bat Mitzvah means that person has reached the stage in their life where they are capable of understanding and complying with these obligations.

Speaking this kind of language puts in perspective the significance of each individual's

role in society. This comes to the original title of this article *The Nature of Dignity*. I would like to suggest that every human being has an innate yearning to be significanta raison d'être. There are very few—if any—who are satisfied being mere cogs in a wheel. The truth, however, is that very few of us will ever achieve the immortality of a Shakespeare or a Beethoven or a Moses, and even those individuals haven't achieved universal significance. What chance, then, do we have?

A profound discovery occurs in the life of an individual when they realize that the nature of dignity—of self-worth—lies in being of service to others. This fundamental truth, which

flies in the face of natural human impulse, is suggested by the English word *knight*, which comes with the title *Sir...* The word is directly related to the German *knecht* (Yes, *gh* was once pronounced *ch* as in the Scottish word *loch*) which means *servant*. In fact one of the mottos of England is *Ich dien* which translates to *I serve*.

So the question shifts to "Who or what do you serve? To whom or what do you devote your life?" The more encompassing the answer, the higher the level of self-worth or human dignity.

Putting this together, becoming an adult essentially means taking on the responsibility to serve others; ones family and society—giving back. Again, from the Jewish perspective, there can be no greater service that represents such giving back than serving the Creator of the Universe—by performing God's commandments; mitzvot. In the process of discovering those commandments and in serving God by one's devotion to family and society, a mere mortal achieves universal significance!



After our 6 p.m. catered dinner, there will be a special Kabbalat Shabbat Service led by our post-Bnei Mitzvah group, The Thirteenth Tribe, and there will be extra materials available to explain and guide everyone through the service. We look forward to seeing you there!



It is my job as your President to give you an interim report on what is happening in your synagogue since our last meeting in June.

Thanks to Rabbi Miller, we continue to have Friday evening services, now occurring at 7:30 p.m. This corresponds to the ending time of our once a month Shabbat dinners. We continue to have Saturday morning Shabbat services beginning at 9:30 a.m., Sunday mornings and national holiday's services begin at 8:30 am. We have now been holding daily services are at 7:30 a.m. on usual weekdays, Monday through Friday. To my knowledge, we are the only California congregation north of the Golden Gate Bridge to offer such an experience. And we always attempt to accommodate anyone who wishes for a special morning or evening service especially for a yahrzeit or a shiva.

Rabbi Miller has been encouraging extensive lay participation in all of our services. While our lay leaders are not as smooth as Rabbi Miller, we have extended participation to many people in our kehilla, and we have thus introduced an element of uncertainty and surprise into many of our services! I believe we are truly praying as a family, and many of us find our services to be truly inspiring.

Our High Holy Day services were very successful, with many visitors. Your gifts in response to our annual Kol Nidre appeal were very generous, and we met our budgeted goal. Since we began our policy of free tickets for

anyone who requests them, and a community break the fast with charges adapted for any individual circumstance, we have had results that were superior to the last year we charged for tickets.

Our survey of the entire High Holy Day season was returned by about 25% of our congregation, with very good comments and almost all positive results. The Religious Practices committee will study your suggestions, and we hope to make our services even more exciting next year.

Rabbi Miller and Rabbi Danzig continue to provide Adult Education. Pnina Loeb continues to increase the number of students in our Religious School. Our Beth Ami and You program continues to provide that link between our Nursery School and Congregation Beth Ami. A big thank you to the entire Beth Ami and You CommitteeSarah Miller, Ronit Glickman, Pnina Loeb, Barbara Tomin, Barb McGee, and a host of volunteer parents.

Probably one of the most important activities we undertook this year was our Beth Ami Community Nursery School Assessment. This effort was led by our Vice-President of Youth and Education, Barbara Tomin, along with Carolyn Metz, Caroline Calvert, Robin Fisher-Tachouet, and the Nursery School teachers and parents, along with parents of alumni of the Nursery School, and some community Jewish parents who chose not to send their Jewish children here. This assessment included exten-

sive surveys, meetings, and interviews. Then there were more meetings, discussions, more meetings, emails, and more meetings. There was a lot of what is called "frank and serious discussion". And there were more meetings. After about 11 months of planning, preparation and execution, and with the help of many consultants, some of them pro bono, we have produced a truly remarkable series of recommendations and suggestions. Over the next two to three years Carolyn, Caroline, Robin, and the teachers and parents of the Nursery School will work on implementation of these recommendations. We hope to position our Jewish nursery school for a long and bright future. After the recent proposal by the state legislature to eliminate all private 4 year old pre-school programs and replace them with public pre-kindergartens, it looks as though we did not get started any too soon.

I cannot say enough about Ellen Brosbe. She gave a great deal of time to this effort, and she will give one hour every month toward fulfilling one of the recommendations, providing professional development for our teachers. Ellen's time will be reimbursed by her educational organization. Thank you Ellen.

All of our synagogue fund raising this year will occur during the next five months. Our big fundraiser will be HaLayla HaGadol, during the week end of Feb. 1st. By enjoying a meal in the home of one of several synagogue families, you will have a chance to eat wonderful

delicious food, and help your synagogue at the same time.


We will celebrate our 70th Anniversary of Congregation Beth Ami on Sunday Feb. 23. This will not be a fund raiser, and it will be priced on a sliding scale and affordable to everyone. We hope many members will attend our festivities that day.

Purim will be Mar. 15 this year, and our longawaited and always popular Purim Spiel will be the weekend of Mar. 22-23. A few sponsorships are still available.

We again had some unforeseen circumstances, and we ended our fiscal year with another modest deficit. For this reason, at our June meeting, we will ask you for a small dues increase, only the second increase in many years.

Your synagogue has voted to continue paying the interest on our Capital Campaign loan from our general operating funds. That means that all Capital Campaign pledges are being used only to decrease our principal balance. Thanks to a generous gift from the Friedman Center Endowment Fund, and thanks to Capital Campaign pledges by many of you last Spring, we are well on our way to retiring this loan in 5 years. We still need to raise approximately \$100,000 in additional pledges to retire our debt, and we plan to ask those of you who have not made a capital campaign contribution yet to consider doing that this year.

I am excited about 2014. I see our synagogue making great strides into a wonderful future. I am happy to answer any questions.

Purim is the holiday on which the distinction of Jewish festival celebration most vividly comes to light.

How does the Jew's Torah differ from the universal concept of learning and scholarship? The key lies in the Book of Esther's choice of the Hebrew word orab—which is the feminine form of light—as a reference to Torah. All wisdom, whose function is to illuminate and enlighten, is light. Torah is not about intellect; the intellect is but a garment, a medium by which to convey the supra-rational essence it clothes. The universal function of the festival or holiday is to celebrate and commemorate the past. The function of the festival is to re-experience the past—or rather, to unearth the timeless essence of a past event that makes it real to one's present existence. We also transcend the present on festivals, and this, too, is a source of joy. But this is not an escapist joy. On the contrary, it is the joy of penetrating to the essence of our present-day self to discover the timeless self within. So ours is a disciplined joy, a joy that shatters external barriers while amplifying internal focus. Ours is a joy that makes us more responsible, more caring, and more committed.

Come in costume, and join the reading of the Book of Esther and let's party on and celebrate our freedom!

Bal Tashchit—not Wasting Resources. Water conservation has been an ongoing concern for several years. The extremely dry conditions that have persisted since 2012 may continue more often in the future, given the current impact of climate change on California's snow-pack—the measure of water content in the snow—which is only 20% of normal.

There's a Drought On—Turn the Water Off! We are now facing the driest year on record, and on January 17th, Governor Brown officially declared a drought emergency in California, calling on Californians to reduce their water usage by 20 percent. This is definitely serious, but we can do it! Start by calculating your water usage at <a href="http://www.saveourh20.org/water-use-calculator">http://www.saveourh20.org/water-use-calculator</a>. The average California household uses 23,275 gallons of water monthly. Whatever your usage is, make it a game of it to see how much you can reduce it. If you can do better than 20%, Mazel Tov!

With tools and information from the 20-gallon Challenge in Sonoma and Marin Counties last year, there was an estimated 4% decrease in water. Now the challenge is to decrease it another 16%.

Saving 20 gallons, or more, of water daily is easy. Of the many resources online for saving water; I really like <a href="http://www.monolake.org/about/waterconservation">http://www.monolake.org/about/waterconservation</a>. Two easy tips: turn the tap off when brushing teeth, shaving, and washing hands (300 gal/month for each action), and water your lawn efficiently (750-1500 gal/month)—better yet, convert it to native plants (more than 2500 gal/month), and get paid to do so (for details and more ideas, see <a href="http://srcity.org/departments/utilities/conserve/">http://srcity.org/departments/utilities/conserve/</a>.

# A Prayer for the Year—for Rain

from Rabbi Elihu Gevirtz, submitted by Miriyam Gevirtz

(recited in the Amidah 3 times each day between December 5 until the evening before Pesach)

"Bless for our benefit, Adonai our God, this year, and every sort of its produce—for the good. Give dew and rain for blessing over the entire face of the land. Quench the thirst of the face of the earth and satiate the entire world from your bounty. Fill our hands from Your blessings and from the wealth of Your gifts. Protect and save this year from all evil, from all types of destruction, and from all types of tribulation. Create for it good hope and a peaceful ending. Take pity and have compassion upon it and upon all its grain and fruit, and bless it with rains of good will, blessing and benevolence. May its end be life, contentment and peace as other good years—for blessing, for You are God, good and beneficent, who blesses the years. Blessed are You, Adonai, who blesses the years."

This is an ancient prayer of our people, going back at 1300 years, probably longer. The translation is that of Rabbi Eliezer Toledano in his *The Orot Sephardic Weekday Siddur*; published by Orot, Inc.

HonestReporting believes that a fully informed public is essential to progress and understanding in conflict resolution. It is not enough to correct inaccurate reporting and expose breaches of journalistic ethics. HonestReporting, through its MediaCentral project, provides support services for journalists based in or visiting Israel, the Palestinian territories,

HonestReporting's work serves the public interest by fighting misinformation, such as

computer manipulations of images that give people a false impression of the conflict. At the same time, it provides agenda-free services to reporters, including translation services and access to news makers to enable them to provide a fuller picture of the situation. Honestreporting has over 140,000 subscribers and its

MediaCentral project handles over 1,000 inquiries from journalists each year.



# **Q&A** for the Kitchen Committee

- **A.** For the best answer, check the Potluck Food Guidelines that are available in the office or on line in our Cybershul or on the Congregation Beth Ami website. If you have any questions, please ask our mashgichim. In general, the purchased foods brought to be used during potlucks must be kosher, must be milk or pareve, and must be brought in in it's original unopened container.
- **Q.** I brought kosher hummus for the potluck following the potluck guidelines, and it wasn't served. Why not?
- **A.** When you bring purchased food for the potluck, please don't be upset if we don't serve it that day. We may have several similar items, so we will use the ones with the earliest expiration dates first.

The kitchen is where community happens and people come together. Thank you for your contributions.

# Choosing an Electricity Supplier

How Will You Decide?

Get beyond the marketing slogans and hear a discussion regarding your choice of electricity suppliers and how it will affect you at a forum on Tuesday, March 4, at 7:00 PM, at Congregation Shomrei Torah, 2600 Bennett Valley Road. Sponsored by the CST Environmental Action Committee, with Congregation Beth Ami as one of the co-organizers, this forum will include the CEO of Sonoma Clean Power, and Senior Vice-President of PG & E for Regulatory Affairs, and will be moderated by the Acting Director of the California Office of Ratepayer Advocates.

Sonoma Clean Power (SCP), formed last year as an alternative to PG & E to bring a local focus to energy purchase and production, will begin phasing in their program on May 1st to 20,000 customers (14,000 businesses and 6,000 residential customers) in unincorporated Sonoma County, and the cities of Cotati, Santa Rosa, Sebastopol, Sonoma and Windsor. Over the next two years, the remaining 200,000 residential, commercial and agricultural customers will be given the choice of SCP.
