# A Morning Concert from my Favorite Bird

Having lived in the land-locked Midwest most of my life, I couldn't help but be charmed by all the natural beauty that is California's. We could sing a "dayenu" for the Pacific Ocean alone: its sheer grandeur, its changing moods, the incredible variety of marine life from the microscopic to the gargantua, not to mention the variety of rock formations to be found in all the coves and beaches along its 840 mile coastline.

From the very beginning of our sojourn in this great state, I felt a certain "wildness" in our surroundings. Humans, as a species, may be capable of "taming" nature, but here in California, Nature has a louder, clearer voice. There are times when she acts in a most giving way, providing various climates to make it possible to grow all kinds of fruit trees in our back yards. Sometimes she sings all kinds of melodies in the variety of songbirds or other creatures such as the mating songs of the frogs. (When I first arrived in Santa Rosa, my Shabbes walk took me over a small stream. I'll never forget the one winter evening when I heard this amazing chorus welling up from its banks). There are times when Nature breaks into screaming through her earthquakes, winds, wildfires and floods. Yet, at the same time, one senses a greater intimacy with our natural surroundings, quite possibly precisely because of this fact.

No small wonder that by and large, native Californians put Nature on a pedestal. They understand to a unique degree just how precious a legacy this is. No one can afford to take her for granted. Here, Nature earns our love and demands our respect.

Being a dog owner entitles me, every day, to an early morning walk, and it's amazing what you can discover in this semi-meditative time. Walking down the street, at a leisurely pace, I couldn't help but pay attention to the beautiful sounds coming from the neighborhood trees. One series of notes, especially captured my attention. I looked up to see where the sounds could be coming from. There on a topmost branch was perched a bird "attired" you might say, in a dress suit, per-



forming what might well be considered a solo concert. I listened more carefully, and realized that while it might repeat its series of notes, it would sound out sets of completely different melodies. I was able to record, albeit poorly, those sounds on my cellphone. When counted, I may have found at least 8 different sets of sounds.

By now, I'm sure you have guessed that I was listening to a mockingbird which has become my favorite bird; not because of its plumage, but because its sheer vocal talent! Here are some of the sounds I recorded:




# Beth Ami Book Group: The Aleppo Codex by Linda Emblen

The Social Action Committee at CBA presents june 2nd First Friday Shabbat Dinner and Presentation: Homelessness and the Caritas Village Project

Service 6:00 Dinner 6:45 Presenters 7:30

Today, almost 3,000 people in Sonoma County are experiencing homelessness. Successive disasters, out-of-control housing costs, and a host of systemic problems have put tens of thousands of our neighbors at risk of financial collapse. With the recent COVID-19 pandemic, their situation is more uncertain than ever.

Caritas Village, an ambitious vision from Santa Rosa Nonprofit Leaders Catholic Charities and Burbank Housing, will consist of two unique yet complementary facilities, Caritas Center and Caritas Homes. Through Catholic Charities' evidence-based housing-focused service model, Caritas Center's 48,000 square feet includes a family shelter, childcare center, drop-in center, and recuperation shelter, as well as a new health clinic partnership with Santa Rosa Community Health.

Caritas Homes aims to create 128 apartments of affordable permanent housing, built and managed by Burbank Housing. It will be home to people who represent a cross-section of our community including working singles, vulnerable seniors, veterans, and families whose income can't keep up with the current rental market.

# What's happening in the CBA Kitchen?

Remember: Our goal for the Kitchen Committee, from it's inception, is to provide mashgichim so more people can use the kitchen and experience the joy of cooking kosher in our kitchen for CBA events. To that end, we have provided training to assist our volunteer mashgichim and all of our mashgichim are volunteers (with Rabbi Miller being our mashgiach-incharge). We have set up various guidelines for using the kitchen and it's various appliances, for maintaining kashrut, and maintaining food safety, to aid all of the cooks who are using the kitchen for CBA events. We provide the mashgichim when the kitchen is used. We also work to maintain the kitchen and get the basic supplies for the kitchen and Shabbat potlucks. All the rest of the work for these events is done by

volunteers. Remember if you want to plan an event you need to take that into consideration in your planning.

The kitchen Committee has been very active these last few months. With Purim we were making and serving hamantashen for onegs, making and serving hors d'oeuvres for the Purim Piano Bar. For Passover, we were preparing, cleaning & kashering the kitchen, setting up for preparing foods for the community Passover Seder, the onegs after the Passover Services, Passover Shabbat lunch, and then reversing the process, bringing the kitchen back for normal use after Passover ended.

In addition to the special celebrations, there have been our Saturday Shabbat potlucks and First Friday monthly dinners. There is a great deal of planning and work involved which couldn't be done without the Kitchen Commit-

#### This Year in Jerusalem

We stood silently as the siren wailed. It was 10am in Jerusalem when the city stood still. It was Holocaust Remembrance Day. This was a moment of somber reflection and respect for the victims of the Holocaust. It was a reminder of the atrocities of the past and the importance of preventing them from happening in the future. It was a reminder that we must never forget the past, and strive to create a better and more tolerant future for all.

Living and Learning. Israeli streets are named after people of significance to the Jewish people and form a part of one's Jewish education. Streets often bear the names of scholars, prophets, authors, and other Jewish figures, providing a tangible connection to Jewish history and tradition. As people go about their daily lives, they are constantly reminded of the Jewish people's rich past. People are constantly surrounded by reminders of Jewish culture and heritage.

Our Surprise. Shops close on Shabbat as well as other Holy Days. The last day of Pesach is such a day. Betty and I learned the hard way. We had planned to take the fast train to Jerusalem, but it was closed. Likewise, the sherut (shared taxi) to Jerusalem was shut down. We ended up sharing a regular taxi ride with another couple. We arrived at the apartment we rented in Old Katamon dead tired. We planned to shop for food the next day, but stores were closed since the end of Pesach is a Shabbaton. The family who owns the apartment saw this and invited us to have lunch with them. They honored the Jewish custom of welcoming strangers, and none were stranger than us. They showed us an immense amount of hospitality and generosity, which is an integral part of Jewish culture. They went out of their way to ensure we were comfortable and taken care of.

Israel has undergone so many changes. Modern highways and tunnels make driving safer

and easier. Once a slum, Katamon is now a high-end neighborhood with luxury condos for sale. The ease with which English speakers can now communicate is another change. It's easy to call a taxi using a phone app, and there are translation apps as well. In the majority of stores and restaurants, you can get along with English. All these conveniences make it hard for us to remember that only a short time ago, English was a rarity in Israel. Are you unsure of the meaning of the label? Take a photo and Google Apps will translate it for you. Planning bus travel has never been easier than with Moovit.

Day Trips. This time we signed up for two day-trips. [An organization supporting west bank settlement] organized the first trip to some sites and Jewish [settlements in the west bank, called Judea by settlers.] Our guide taught us so much Jewish and Biblical history. That trip ended with a visit to a huge greenhouse where flowers are grown. Israel left behind a similar one in Gaza when it was handed over to Palestinian control. Israel's hope was that the Palestinian leadership would establish a flourishing home for the Arab community. The greenhouses were given to help the Palestinian people and economy. The Palestinian Authority destroyed those greenhouses.

We also traveled to the Negev with the JNF to visit their Sderot Indoor Playground, Be'er Sheva's water reservoir, and the Ayalon Institute. The JNF does phenomenal work not only planting trees but improving the lives of all Israelis and Israel's environment. The JNF has been involved in projects such as constructing a new rail network, building parks, and providing resources to ensure the sustainability of Israel's water supply. They also work to develop educational opportunities, health and social services, and economic development initiatives in Israel.

Hebrew University of Jerusalem. I graduated from Hebrew University over a half-century ago. Boy, has it changed! The well-landscaped new/old campus is a delight for the senses and full of history. I write new/old because, co-founded

by Albert Einstein and Dr. Chaim Weizmann in July 1918, the public university officially opened in June 1925. But the university had to abandon that campus in 1948. However, the university has since recovered and is now thriving. It has a world-renowned faculty and is one of the leading research universities in the world. It is new because starting in 1967 when the land was restored to Israel, most of the new campus was built. Betty and I visited the psychology department and were treated like royalty. A worldfamous neural cognitive psychologist spent an hour of her precious time showing us her various labs. Her fundamental research may one day help the blind, the aged, and those with mental impairments.

Israeli Arabs and Palestinian Arabs are welcome to study at Israel's universities. Palestinian Arab high schools follow a Jordanian curriculum that lacks some topics necessary for college success. Hebrew U offers highly subsidized programs to compensate for this, so they can succeed in their regular university studies.

*Studying in English*. Hebrew University and other Israeli universities offer well-run English programs and degrees. Additionally, the Jewish National Fund offers courses in English for high school students.

The Real Israel. The media in the United States magnifies Israel's political and security issues. The only time we saw soldiers was when we crossed into Palestinian controlled areas. Despite the recent economic boom, Israelis are most concerned about the economy and the rise of the far right in government. Israelis are also concerned about security. The Palestinian Authority and Hamas teaching children to hate Jews creates an atmosphere of violence and animosity that leads to conflict and violence.

Everywhere we visited, in Jerusalem, Mivatzeret Zion, Ramat Aviv, and B'nai Brak, we observed people who were happy (except for the prices). Come see for yourself. For your next trip to Europe or Africa, stop in Israel. From here you can fly inexpensively to Europe, Asia, and North Africa.

# CONSERVATIVE/MASORTI MOVEMENT ORGANIZATIONS COMMEND NETANYAHU'S DECISION TO SUSPEND JUDICIAL REFORM PROPOSALS

Monday March 27, 2023: In response to the Israeli government's suspension of legislative consideration of judicial reform measures, Conservative/Masorti movement organizations issued the following statement:

"We commend Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for his decision to temporarily suspend his coalition's controversial judicial reform proposals. We are pleased that this policy has been postponed until at least after Passover, giving time for reflection on the potential ramifications of such an extreme overhaul. We salute the hundreds of thousands who filled the streets of Israel rallying for democracy. We also salute those within the coalition who listened to concerned voices in Israel and abroad and who have pushed for a government responsive to its citizens.

The Conservative/Masorti movement is committed to promoting the values of justice, equality, and democracy in Israel and around the world. We believe that the suspension of this proposal is a step in the right direction, and we call on all parties to work together to ensure that the rights and freedoms of all citizens are protected. This is the time to strengthen the State of Israel as a Jew-

ish and democratic state as established in Israel's Declaration of Independence.

We believe ardently that the proposed judicial reform is fraught with danger and goes against the principles of democracy. Democracy exists to protect the rights of minority parties against subjugation by a majority, or even a super-majority. The proposed legislation would have undermined the independence of the judiciary and jeopardized the democratic fabric of Israeli society.

The firing of Defense Minister Yoav Gallant following his call to pause this legislative push is also deeply concerning. Gallant's comments about security vulnerabilities raised by these divisions cannot be ignored. We expect the government to prioritize compromise and work towards a more cohesive and united Israel that ensures the safety and security of all citizens.

On the eve of celebrating Israel's 75 years of independence, we aspire to a State of Israel which continues to build a future of stability and prosperity as a Jewish and democratic state."


