

Conversion to Judaism: it' not easy

Alex Schellenger – Shmuel ben Avraham v'Sara

Conversion to Judaism takes work. It requires a change in beliefs, actions, lifestyle, extensive study, practice, a leap of faith, a shift in perception, and some sacrifice. However, for those who feel it is the right decision, it can be an exciting and rewarding experience.

Before stepping into the mikvah — the ritual of immersion in water that is the culmination of the conversion process — prospective converts to Judaism reflect on what kind of observance they want to follow and how they want to live their life as Jews.

Alex and I spent all day last week going to the beautiful JCC in Los Gatos, to follow this tradition. The experience reminded me once again how converts often make remarkable Jews, as they have consciously chosen to take active steps in embracing Judaism.

A person considering conversion often begins by finding a rabbi who helps guide them through the process, starting with a study period, which might mean organized classes or individual study. The rabbi determines which Beit Din — a rabbinical court of three rabbis — will oversee the conversion.

For Alex, I was proudly one of these three Rabbis, along with my friends, Rabbi Steve Finley from Sonoma, and Rabbi Adam Ruditsky from Plano, Texas.

Congregation Beth Ami offers a course for those considering conversion — as well as anyone wanting to learn more about the Jewish faith. Converts learn about Jewish values, traditions, and history, including Conservative traditions and observance. In addition to the classes, participants learn to read prayers in Hebrew and take part in Shabbat and holiday services.

It is a great challenge to provide someone with the tools and information that they need in only a few months to feel a part of the Jew-

ish community. Alex is already feeling like an integral member of our congregation and the Jewish tribe.

While I believe I'm an entertaining teacher, at Congregation Beth Ami, our conversion process is not a "conversion light." I do not convert people to Conservative Judaism. I convert them to Judaism. I do not want converts to feel different from someone who was born Jewish. It is a process of personal growth.

Immersion in the mikvah is not the culmination of learning, but only the beginning. Alex has embraced not only Jewish learning but also actively engages with Jewish practices and within the Jewish community. Converts like Alex remind us of the richness they bring to the Jewish community, and how much we can learn from them.

Becoming a Jew is not an event. It is a process. I am excited for Alex to continue his Jewish learning and be involved in Judaism with all his heart. We need more people like Alex. We can learn from people like Alex.

As the Beit Din of the three Rabbis declared – the process was "Kosher" – Alex now officially belongs to the Jewish people, and we are excited to welcome him to our family, our mishpacha.




Save the Date: A Completely Unknown Megillah, Sunday March 16 3:00 pm



Future Plans

School closings are putting stress on students in our community. Post Covid isolation is a real problem for immune-compromised people and the elderly. The unhoused population is dealing with uncertainty every day. We are working on developing a panel of representatives from public organizations and health professionals to come to speak to our congregation about these community issues.

After a hiatus during COVID, Beth Ami's Israel Committee has been reactivated with Nancy Fleming and Betty Boyd as co-chairs.

As stated in Beth Ami's bylaws, "The purpose of the Israel Committee is (a) to provide nonpolitically-biased activities and programming to advance in our congregation and community love for the Jewish State and love for Jewish People throughout the world and (b) to alert our community to the dangers of anti-Semitism in all its forms and to work toward supporting

those harmed by anti-Semitism."

Our aim is CLEAR: Communicate with others, Learn the facts. Educate others. Act for peace, and Respond to antisemitism.

At our meeting in December, we discussed the following projects, events, and activities.

Bears Lumbering Along: A report from our first teddy bear meeting

We had a great time at our first meeting. We laughed, we helped each other, we laughed, we traded ideas, and we laughed some more. We shared stories of how we learned to knit and why we are doing this. One member summed it up: It's God's work.

Ten creators attended. Five more couldn't make it today but plan to come next month. Four others are knitting from home. Three supporters have donated yarn, and another will donate money to cover shipping the first bears. Heartfelt thanks to all. Everyone is invited to help cover ongoing international shipping costs. So even if you don't do needlework, you can still help traumatized Israeli children.

There was a 70-year span of ages; members of Beth Ami and Shomrei Torah; shul and churchgoers; creators who sew, knit, and crochet. We each started a bear and will continue making it at home.

After Hanukah, Before Purim

After Hanukah, the Jewish calendar heads into a quiet period. On Friday, January 10, we have the fast of Tevet 10; there is a tradition to mourn, fast, reflect and remember the Babylonian seige laid to Jerusalem, by Nebuchadnezzar. On Thursday, February 13th; there is a minor celebration of Tu B'Shevat (or the New Year for the Trees).

In Israel, at this time, it is 'mid winter' and the rains have decreased, and the fruit trees begin to blossom, starting with the almond trees. We in California enjoy a similar climate and can really appreciate the holiday as we see almond orchards bloom in the Central Valley and Santa Rosa plum trees blossom in our yards.

The celebration of Tu B'Shevat revolves around the trees, the seder, and Tikkunim. The seder developed in the 16th century from Kabbalist origins to celebrate the Tree of Life, the Kabbalistic map of the Sephirot. Today the seder lives which is coming up in April... incorporates at least 12 fruits {wheat (as the



basis for our sustenance), olives, dates, grapes, figs, pomegranates, etrogim, apples, walnuts, almonds carobs, and pears} and 4 cups of wine, with blessings and discussions ranging from Kabbalistic traditions, and ecological interpretations, to Zionism. You might want to look up this fascinating holiday to read, and if you are of a mind, compare it to the other seder in our

Of course, after Tu B'Shevat its about 28 days

until ... Purim, which starts on the eve of March 13, 2025. ~janet Stein-Larson
