My message this month contains two distinct and diverse thoughts about the holidays: the first deals with "content" and the second with "form."

#### Content

Each year as we approach Rosh Hashanah, we tend to greet the New Year with a combination of anticipation and apprehension. On one hand, we look forward to new opportunities, new relationships and new ways to better ourselves and our circumstances. Some of this is newness is expected and is, therefore, met with a sense of equanimity and composure. Sometimes, the newness is thrust upon us and we're completely unprepared. New people walk into our lives: perhaps a new co-worker or a new neighbor. New situations present themselves: perhaps new job demands, the birth of a child or a grandchild, or maybe a wedding. On the other hand, we apprehensively await the great unknown of our future. Will our circumstances change for the worse; will we be faced with horrible choices, will we experience ill health or the death of a loved one? Of course, no one has the crystal ball (or maybe it's the Magic 8 Ball) to answer these questions or to allay our fears. We can only hope that we will find the inner resources to meet the challenges as they come.

I'm constantly amazed at the strength that people demonstrate during the challenging moments in their lives. Day in and day out I listen to the personal woes, victories, trials, and successes of ordinary people who are faced with incredible challenges...having the need to make decisions and to face the hard task of living. I'm never quite sure from where their inner resources come. They often seem totally beaten down and hopeless, and yet somewhere they find an inner strength and, not only the will, but the ability to face their challenge and emerge "victorious." I don't know if this is "faith," or "love," or "desire," or "commitment." Perhaps it's a combination of all of them. But as one who has seen much (and, thankfully, experienced little) of these kinds of challenges, I find the human capacity to triumph over adversity to be simply amazing.

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur always seem to me to be the time when we can call upon that capacity to face ourselves and then draw upon those reserves to make the changes that are necessary in our lives. The holidays present us with an opportunity to ask the deepest questions of ourselves. What are our values? How do we really relate to others: family and friends? How do we spend our time? What message do we convey to others about our priorities? Where do we turn when faced with adversity? How gracious are we in our defeats and how humble are we in our victories? How do we want to respond to adversity? How can we better respond to the vagaries of life?

Much of our success in finding answers to these questions depends upon just how seriously we take these holidays, for I believe that it's through knowing ourselves that we can best find that inner strength and those inner resources. If we approach these days merely as occasions to perpetuate family traditions, or communal expectations, or some vague notion of religious commitment, we'll find ourselves acknowledging that while we might have entered the sanctuary looking for some grand experience, some grand awakening, we'll leave unfulfilled and disappointed once again. If we're willing, however, to admit that the purpose of our presence is to change, that during the hours in shul it's not whether we speak the words, but whether the words speak to us, it's not whether we go through the Machzor but whether the Machzor goes through us, then there is the possibility for true change, for a true realization that we possess strengths, resources, and abilities to face whatever the New Year will bring whether that be the fulfillment of all our fondest dreams or the horror of our worst nightmares.

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur afford us the annual opportunity to evaluate ourselves, to decide what's critical and what's superfluous in our lives, and to identify our wellsprings of faith and inner strength. I encourage you to come to services with this objective in mind. And I pray that you will be successful in that evaluation.

#### Form

You will find this year that we have purchased a new Machzor. It is a companion volume to the Siddur we use every Shabbat. As with our Siddur, you will find a greater use of transliterations making the text more accessible to those who don't read Hebrew. The English texts are also gender neutral eliminating the extensive use of the masculine pronouns for God. There is also the inclusion of the names of the matriarchs as we find in our Shabbat Siddur as well.

It is our hope that this new Machzor will add to the holiday experience by making the Hebrew prayers somewhat more accessible, by removing linguistic impediments to one's connection to God, by being more inclusive, and by offering readings in English that will enhance the spiritual connection that each of us has to the holidays.

It was also felt that with the changes in our physical structure, this might be the perfect time to make this liturgical change as well. It will be a New Year, with new facilities, a new Machzor, and hopefully, a new appreciation of Beth Ami, the Jewish community, our commitment to Judaism and our future.

Paula joins me in wishing each of you a happy and healthy New Year, blessed with the love of family and friends.

## Ethiopian Jews in Israel

Save the date - Wednesday, November 14 at 7 p.m.for a fascinating presentation on Ethiopian Jews in Israel, by writer Len Lyons, author of the book of the same name. Mr. Lyons spent over three years writing the book, traveling around Israel, interviewing Jewish immigrants from Ethiopia, both to hear their stories and see how well they are faring, how well their children are (or are not) assimilating into mainstream Israeli culture. He was accompanied by a wellknown Israeli photographer, and the result is a beautifully illustrated, comprehensive book on the topic. Lyons covers the Ethiopian experience from the group's beginnings in Africa, their transfer to Israel, and their experiences throughout the past several decades as they have worked to adapt to a modern, industrialized society. The ED is responsible for day-to-day synagogue administration including all support functions; management of professional and support staff, fiscal management; member relations and facilities management.







## MEMO FROM JERUSALEM Bob Raful

This memo was written between August 8-10. It describes the early August landscape in this part of Israel – wall to wall crowds of people and an overwhelming number of motor vehicles on all roads.

We left new Ben Gurion Airport shortly after 7 p.m. on August 8 in our Eldan rental and breezed along Road 1 until we got close to Sha'ar ha-Gai, the narrow canyon that ascends the Judean Hills to Jerusalem. It was bumper to bumper and even worse as we approached the entrance to the City. I have seldom seen so many vehicles trying to squeeze through the main intersections.

The point of the preceding minutia, is to explain how I answered the question—why the unusual crowds? From several sources I learned:

- A. Last year, at this time, Israel was suffering the trauma of the Second Lebanon War. If it wasn't actual fear of rockets from the North, it was constant concern for friends and family. It was not a "normal" August.
- B. In a snap-back reaction THIS August, Israel has found multiple ways to celebrate: A major street fair took over central Ben Yehuda St. on the night we arrived; an expanded Khutzot Hayotzer, the international crafts, in an area just outside the Jaffa Gate side of the Old City walls, is attracting thousands of visitors during its ten day run; and, new to me, an ultra-Orthodox tradition which draws thousands of people—young families with many children, teenage Yeshiva boys by the busload, carloads with a mixture and crowded taxis—all converge on favorite Jerusalem sites during a period known as BEIN HAZMANIM, "...a relatively joyful bit of time between the days of mourning for the Temple's destruction and the repentance days of the Jewish month of Elul."
- C. So, now I know that a crowded, celebrating Jerusalem, is a "normal" August. What a country!

#### Levels of an important mitzvah

I discovered soon after becoming President that understanding the way a synagogue operates financially is rather important. While motivated people and good ideas are the keys to creating new programs and community, many of the efforts to build synagogue life founder in the organizational struggle to achieve fiscal health. The central element of a synagogue's financial well-being is the willingness and capability of its members to voluntarily support the synagogue with donations. There are three major types of donations that are important.

**Operations**: By now, most of you have received a letter from Rabbi Schlesinger and me urging you to make a financial pledge in support of annual operations at Beth Ami. The annual appeal is the single largest fundraising effort of the year. These donations go directly to support our annual budget – salaries of our Rabbi and staff, utility bills, school supplies, and all of the other expenses necessary to keep Beth Ami running. We encourage every member to make a contribution, no matter how small or large, to fulfill the *mitzvah* of supporting the synagogue for all of our community.

Capital Investments: I think that we are all tremendously excited about the renovation of our site, which is now underway. Personally, I feel a surge of energy going through our membership as we see our beautiful building emerging anew. This significant effort is due to the willingness of many of our members who pledged substantial sums of money in support of a major project. Their financial commitment is paid out over time, and is an investment in the synagogue's future. While the renovation is transforming our facility, we are also aware of other areas needing investment – that is, substantial financial pledges targeted for future benefit to the congregation. We know that not all of our members can make this type of commitment. We are grateful to those who can, and who do so.

**Endowment:** Another type of investment is meant to also help the synagogue over time, but this is money that is invested for financial growth. The income from such an investment is then designated for specific uses, such as programming, or building maintenance, or financing Religious School for all members. In the long run, creating and growing endowment is the best way to insure the survival and health of our synagogue.

Our financial goals include all of these levels of donations. We strive to operate the synagogue year to year, balancing our expenses and our revenues. We intend to continue investing in the upkeep and improvement of our wonderful physical facility. We hope to initiate significant efforts to build endowment to sustain our programs and activities. The achievement of these goals not only will insure the health of Beth Ami in the future, they will represent the love and commitment of our members for their Jewish home.

#### Why forgiveness?

I've discovered a wonderful website (http://www.jewelsofelul) to help me prepare for the High Holidays. Some of you, too, have shared this with me. It's called "Jewels of Elul"—and each day in this month that leads us to the Yamin Noraim/the Days of Awe, a new person (from Deepak Chopra to the Dalai Lama and Kirk Douglas to Matisyahu) offers thoughts on "Hope and Healing."

On the subject of "forgiveness," I offer Elul 2's inspiration by Rabbi Harold Kushner, entitled "A Favor We Do Ourselves."

One year, my Yom Kippur sermon was on the theme of forgiveness. The next day, a woman came to see me, very upset about the sermon. She told me how, 10 years earlier, her husband had left her for a younger woman and she has had to raise two children by herself for the past 10 years. She asked me angrily, "And you want me to forgive him for what he did to us?"

I told her, "Yes, I want you to forgive him. Not to excuse him, not to say that what he did was acceptable, but to forgive him as a way of saying that someone who would do that has no right to live inside your head any more than he has the right to live inside your house. Why are you giving a man like that the power to turn you into a bitter, vengeful woman? He doesn't deserve that power over you."

Forgiveness is not a favor we do for the person who offended us. It is a favor we do for ourselves, cleansing our souls of thoughts and memories that lead us to see ourselves as victims and make our lives less enjoyable. When we understand we have little choice as to what other people do but we can always choose how we will respond to what they do, we can let go of those embittering memories and enter the New Year clean and fresh.

L'shana Tova Tekatev v'etachetem ... May we *all* be inscribed for a sweet and good year.

Does the name Hank Greenberg ring a bell? Hank Greenberg was a baseball superstar and a hero to Jewish baseball fans at a time when Jews and other minorities were not particularly welcome in baseball or other major league sports. Anti-Semitism was alive and well in the U.S. at that time and Jews embraced

this 6'4", 210 pound slugger with unrestrained enthusiasm.

In 1934 "Hammerin' Hank" Greenberg and his team, the Detroit Tigers, were in the pennant race. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur were fast approaching and Hank Greenberg was faced with a dilemma. Yes, Hank was a team and league leader and

one heck of a batter. He was also a Jew.

"The team was fighting for first place, and I was probably the only batter in the lineup who was not in a slump. But in the Jewish religion, it is traditional that one observe the holiday solemnly, with prayer. One should not engage in work or play. And I wasn't sure what to do."

Hank asked his rabbi to help him come to a decision. Solomon would have blanched if faced with such a decision, especially if he'd been a baseball fan. His rabbi told him that Rosh Hashanah was a "festive holiday" and that it would be O.K. to play. So Hank played and hit two home runs including the one, in the ninth inning, that won the game. Was Hank happy? Here are Hank's own words:

"I caught hell from my fellow parishioners, I caught hell from some rabbis, and I don't know what to do. It's ten days until the next holiday – Yom Kippur."

The Sporting News reported Hank's decision with one sentence: "Hank Greenberg was absent from the Detroit lineup because of his observance of Yom Kippur." And popular poet, Edgar A. Guest, immortalized the occasion in a poem, the last half of which is printed in the center of this page.

Those Jewish holidays are coming again. Decisions will have to be made. Tell the children the story of Hank Greenberg and the story of Sandy Koufax who, in 1965, refused to pitch in the first game of the World Series because it fell on Yom Kippur.

To save water, reduce watering 20% and be sure to water between midnight and 6 a.m. to reduce evaporation. Last month, in this column, I noted that Sonoma County had only reduced Russian River water usage by 9.9% of the 15% required by the State. Then it was reported that usage had dropped by 19%, which sounded like we were really doing a great job of conserving. But, as noted in a Press Democrat editorial on August 15, only part of that reduction came from conservation; the rest came from water pumped from city and county water agency wells. In Santa Rosa, conservation only amounted to 10.4%. Using water from these wells only postpones the inevitable, while lowering the water table. Santa Rosa has two programs that will pay you to reduce watering by replacing grass and older toilets. Go to ci.santa-rosa.ca.us/ default.aspx?PageId=2308 for information on the "Green Exchange Program" and the "High Efficiency Toilet Program."

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
