## **RABBI's REMARKS** Rabbi George Schlesinger

When we Jews think about the Jewish calendar and the repetitive rituals of Judaism, we might think of the daily rituals like davening three times daily or the observance of Kashrut (the dietary laws). We might think of the weekly ritual of Shabbat, or the monthly ritual of Rosh Chodesh, (the beginning of the new month), or the annual rituals of all the various holidays (High Holy Days, the Pilgrimage festivals, Purim. Chanukah, etc.) Few of us spend time thinking about the 19-year cycle of the calendar which adjusts and realigns our lunar calendar with the solar calendar allowing us to continue celebrating the holidays in their proper season. Without the addition of those leap years (adding an additional 30-day month seven times during the 19-year cycle), we'd soon be celebrating Chanukah in July and Pesach in November.

As Abe Friedman wrote in his introduction to Massekhet Ha-Hammah (Tractate on the Sun)

"Every twenty-eight years, Jews gather to mark a unique occasion: the moment at which the sun returns to the spot it occupied in the heavens at the moment of its creation, on the Fourth Day. For more than a millenium, Birkat Ha-Hammah ("The Blessing of the Sun") has offered Jews the opportunity to stop, reflect on God's role and our role in creating and sustaining the universe, and give thanks for the natural bounty that surrounds us.

"Birkat Ha-Hammah is an anomalous moment in the Jewish calendar. We follow a predominantly lunar calendar, marking time and setting our holidays according to the moon's monthly cycles, but Birkat Ha-Hammah is tied to a purely solar moment: once, every twenty-eight years, when the vernal (Spring) equinox falls on a Tuesday night. Astute observers will notice, however, that the date of Birkat Ha-Hammah in 2009, April 8, is much later than the vernal equinox on March 20. While the ancient astronomical calculations were strikingly accurate — they differ from modern scientific observations by a matter of minutes — over the centuries, minutes add up to days. These slight inaccuracies, combined with medieval recalibrations in the solar calendar, move the date of Birkat Ha-Hammah progressively later. As a result, Birkat Ha-Hammah in 2009 falls out on the morning before Pesach, the date of the Fast of the Firstborn."

# Jill Levy, of the Jewish Theological Seminary, further wrote in her study guide to Massekhet Ha-Hammah,

"According to the Hebrew Bible, the sun was created on the fourth day. 'And God made the two great lights: the greater light to rule the day, and the lesser light to rule the night; and the stars. And God set them in the firmament of the heaven to give light upon the earth, and to rule over the day and over the night, and to divide the light from the darkness; and God saw that it was good. And there was evening and there was morning, a fourth day.' (Genesis 1:16-19) Rabbinic tradition adds that creation occurred during the Hebrew month of Nisan, the time of the year when the days become longer. It is taught that the sun

was created Tuesday night, the fourth of Nisan. Birkat Ha-Hammah occurs on the day that the vernal equinox coincides with the

> fourth of Nisan, which is once every 28 years. Due to only slight overestimations of the solar and lunar years, in combination with the establishment of the Gregorian calendar, these two days rarely actually coincide. However, the Rabbis' prediction is always close.

> > "The connection between Passover this year and Birkat Ha-Hammah is even more astounding. In 2009, Birkat Ha-Hammah will be April 8, which means that it overlaps with the eve of Passover and the Fast of the Firstborn. Given that this coincidence is extremely rare, it is truly a once in a lifetime opportunity to learn this tractate for the siyyum of the Fast of the Firstborn. In addition, Birkat Ha-Hammah is based solely upon the solar calendar while Passover is based more on the lunar calendar. In this way, the joining of these two events constitutes a uniting of the "two great lights," which are normally separate from one another."

The source for all this comes from the Talmud, Tractate Berachot 59b:

Our rabbis taught: He who sees the sun at its turning point, the moon in its power, the planets in their orbits or the signs of the zodiac in their order should say:

"Blessed are You who makes the work of creation." And when does this happen? Abaye said: Every twenty-eight years when the cycle begins again and the Nisan (Spring) equinox fall in Saturn on the evening of Tuesday, going into Wednesday.

The upshot of all this is that on Wednesday morning, April 8 at 7:30 a.m., coinciding with the Siyyum Bechorim (the service and study to preempt the Fast of the Firstborn), we will take this opportunity to celebrate the rarest of all Jewish calendar rituals. Since most of us will have the opportunity to celebrate Birkat Ha-Hammah no more than three times in our lives and only a few rare individuals might have the good fortune of celebrating it four times, and since this might be the ONLY time in our lives when it coincides with Erev Pesach and the service of the Firstborn, I invite everyone in the congregation to attend this service. For many of you, it may be a "once-in-a-lifetime event." Bring your children (let them miss school...or at least arrive late. I'll be happy to write them a religious "excuse") so that they can experience this unique occasion. I guarantee they (and you) will always remember the time they (and you) attended the service for Birkat Ha-Hammah. The service and the ritual itself might not seem that "impressive" or "awesome," but it will always be part of your memory bank.

I look forward to seeing you at 7:30 a.m. on Wednesday, April 8.

I want to wish all of you a very happy and Kosher Pesach.





## MEMO FROM JERUSALEM

As noted in last month's column, I have drawn on the adventures of Roberta Berg and her friend, Stan Roodman, during their two month+ stay in Israel. By the time you read this, our friends will have returned to Santa Rosa; but you can relive all their activities by logging on to their blog: <u>http://stanandroberta.blogsport.com/.</u>

In the meantime, here are some highlights I enjoyed:

"After morning lectures at Pardes, we took #21 bus to the Herzl Museum on the bottom of Mt. Herzl. One follows Herzl life from one stage to another as one goes from one room to another. Also displayed is his complete library transported from Vienna. They also recreate in smaller scale the Basel venue of the first of several International Zionist convention where an actor on film delivers some of his speeches. The tour ends with a wonderful travel log thru current Israel showing an amazing landscape and diversity. Most moving! Without his vision it is hard to see how Israel would come into being after only 50 years from his dream and goal. On the National Cemetery above, Herzl has the most prominent burial site. His whole family is also buried here along with a memorial to his daughter killed in the Holocaust. Next is Jabotinsky as the second most prominent tomb followed by Rabin, then all the Prime Ministers of the early period and key Zionist Presidents. We also visited the soldiers' graves from 1949 thru 1973 wars. Very emotional experience there.

"Later that evening, went to David Hartman's lecture on Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan and his unsuccessful attempt to change 20<sup>th</sup> century Judaism in America. Hartman tried to do the same with orthodoxy. " (Bob: Dr. David Hartman, Founder-Director of the Hartman Institute is one of the most respected scholar-teachers in the Jewish world).

Then from another blog, a day when our friends toured part of the Tel Aviv University campus, they were taken on a private tour, about 40 minutes up the coast from Tel Aviv:

"We drove to Zichron Ya'acov one of the earliest Jewish agricultural settlements of modern times on land was purchased in 1880 by Baron Rothschild to begin the re-building of a Jewish homeland. The town was built on top of a small mountain for security. The original main street is now a lovely pedestrian mall with many shops and restaurants including the Tishbi Winery and Restaurant where we had a delightful lunch and some fine wine."

All of which reminds me to remind you that April 29 is Yom Ha'Atzmaut, Israel's 61<sup>st</sup> birthday. Santa Rosa will mark the day with a celebration. There are details on page 7.

Pray for the Peace of Jerusalem.




## New Member News

## P'kuach Nefesh—Saving a Life

**April is National Donate Life Month.** If you aren't already an organ donor, register now at <u>www.ctdn.org/</u>; it only takes a minute. Register regardless of your age or health, because more people are eligible than think they are. Let your family members know you're registered.

Help increase the number of living donors. Currently 78,209 of those waiting for an organ transplant are waiting for a kidney; every one of them *could* have a kidney from a living donor. However, the cost of travel and lost wages can be a significant barrier for living donors. (Medical expenses are covered by the recipient's insurance.) H.R. 218, the Living Organ Donor Tax Credit Act of 2009, would provide a non-refundable tax credit of up to \$5,000 to offset those expenses, making it possible for those who could not otherwise afford to do so to donate a kidney, liver, lung, pancreas, intestine, bone marrow, or any part thereof. Call Rep. Lynn Woolsey at 707/542-7182; urge her to support and co-sponsor H.R. 218. Or request her support at http:// capwiz.com/kidney/issues/bills/?bill=12731371. She's more likely to respond to telephone calls. Tell her this "cost-neutral" bill would ultimately save taxpayers millions, even billions of dollars. Dialysis, usually covered by a Medicare program, costs \$71,000 annually. Last year 5,394 people became living donors. Just doubling that number could save almost \$400 million a year in dialysis costs.

April is a busy month in terms of celebrations. First we have the joy of celebrating Passover. Last April I wrote about the resources the library has, including 22 Haggadot, 24 children books, five cassettes and four videos. This year Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, falls on April 21. Check last May's Shofar for recommendations about books and videos related to this solemn day. Since last year the related part of our collection grew with 24 items. Here are some you might be interested in:

- Black: *IBM and the Holocaust* exploring the question, "was IBM, 'The Solutions Company,' partly responsible for the Final Solution?"
- Bower: Nazi Gold the subtitle of the books is telling: The Full Story of the Fifty-Year Swiss-Nazi Conspiracy to Steal Billions from Europe's Jews and Holocaust Survivors.
- Dodd: Letters from Nuremberg Thomas Dodd's personal letters from the Nuremburg trial to his wife as presented by his son, Senator Christopher Dodd (our copy is signed by the Senator).
- ▶ Gaon: Del Fuego: Sephardim and the Holocaust A collection of lectures documenting the annihilation of the great Sephardic centers.
- ▶ Justman: *The Jewish Holocaust for Beginners* A graphic novel for adults and children.
- Petropoulos: *The Faustian Bargain* An invaluable account of how certain artists profited from the Nazi system.
- On April 29 we honor Israel's Independence Day. For this occasion the library put together a bibliography of some of the items we have about Eretz Yisrael, its history and people. You can pick it up at our commemoration, in the library or download it from the library's website.

As you can see there are plenty of reasons to visit the library around holidays. You don't need one though to come on in, you are welcome any time.




